Differentiation:

Developing Questions to support using adverbs of manner and time in a sentence with one to two simple clauses. For example: I ran quickly down the street to the shop.

Expected Questions to support using adverbs of manner, time, place and frequency in a sentence with two expanded clauses. For example: The little dog ran quickly across the road, to get to the park for his walk.

Greater Depth Questions to support using adverbs in multi-clause sentences where adverbs of time, frequency, place or manner are used. Also includes adverbs that modify the whole sentence. For example: Obviously, due to the worsening weather, I decided to stay indoors today where it is warm and cosy so that I could finish reading my favourite book peacefully.
